Fostered from the corner of the world we affectionately call home, the Foundation's geographic territory encompasses 35 counties and makes us the largest Community Foundation in the state by territory. As you review the 2013 Report to the Community, you will learn that the Community Foundation of South Georgia and our donors are making a difference in our South Georgia Community, the Southeastern Region and the Nation to impact lives.

We are often asked about the depth and breadth of the impact of the Community Foundation of South Georgia and in tandem, which is the greater: to make a deep or a wide impact with grant dollars? The answer is often relative to the size and mission of the recipient as well as the donor's intentions. Some organizations impact a small geographic region or demographic while others have regional, national and international impact. Some donors prefer to make smaller grants annually, quarterly or monthly to the same organizations they have historically supported, while others recognize that the needs and services are ever-changing and so are the granting opportunities. There is no wrong answer. Ultimately, it is philanthropy, brotherly love and charitable dollars that fuel the organizations that are serving our community.

The Community Foundation brought fiscal year 2013 to a close with the highest asset balance since inception, with over \$62 million under management. Our assets are comprised of 317 funds: 151 Donor Advised, 85 Nonprofit Endowment, 45 Scholarship, 25 Field of Interest, 8 Designated and 3 Unrestricted funds. We welcomed 31 new funds to the Foundation in 2013 while helping our new fund representatives and donors explore funding and grant making opportunities and connecting funds to the causes and organizations of interest. New funds represent an extraordinary 10 different counties throughout South Georgia, North Georgia and the Southeastern United States. We added one fund in Colquitt, Crisp, Decatur, Fulton, Randolph and Seminole Counties, while adding two new funds in Dougherty and Early Counties, three funds in Lowndes County, four in Grady County, thirteen funds in Thomas County, and one fund in another state. Through the generation of new funds and contributions to existing funds at the foundation, we received over 1,000 gifts in 2013 that totaled more than \$8 million.

The breadth of our work is reflected in our giving. Aggregate grants of over \$11 million made 2013 a phenomenal year for grant making. A more panoramic view of the grants and grantees supersedes the monumental dollar value of the total grants. The Foundation made approximately 1,740 grants to 530 different grantees in 33 different states. Over \$10,155,000 was granted within the Southeastern Region of the United States and the majority of those funds, or a little more than \$10,129,700, circulated back into our home state of Georgia. Of that total, \$9,791,233 was granted within our Southwest Georgia region.

The year marked our inaugural unrestricted grant cycle through the Community Funds grants. Through generous contributions from our donors, the Foundation was able to create a grant cycle for 10 South Georgia counties. Through a process of requesting proposals for general operations or supplements to existing programs, nonprofits were able to request up to \$5,000 for their organizations. Local committees in each of the communities served as delegates and made decisions as to the grantees and the amounts of each grant based on their knowledge of the needs of their respective communities. We are hopeful that 2014 will provide yet another opportunity to host an open grant cycle to further our vision of being the recognized resource for helping donors and nonprofit organizations meet community needs forever.




